A Richard Pratt Legacy



Cancer survivorship and general practice

The increase in the number of Victorians living with cancer or who have had a diagnosis of cancer has placed increased pressure on oncology services and led to proposals for shared care practice. There is evidence that general practice is well positioned to provide post-treatment follow up care.

In 2016, the Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) funded the Australian Cancer Survivorship Centre – A Richard Pratt legacy (ACSC) to develop a suite of <u>videos</u> for general practice based health professionals, hospital based health professionals and cancer survivors.

The <u>videos</u> were developed to illustrate the role of generalists in shared cancer care after treatment (survivorship care).

Suggested discussion points for health professional educators

- 1. Discuss the key messages conveyed by the video *Examples*
 - a. Shared care provides better care
 - i. is better because patients receive holistic, coordinated care
 - ii. requires quality information from specialist
 - b. There needs to be clarity around roles and responsibilities
 - c. Patients appreciate and accept shared care
 - d. Optimal Care Pathways (best practice care pathways) are a useful resource
- 2. Describe what general practice can do during cancer survivorship. *Examples:*
 - a. Provide coordinated comprehensive care including managing existing conditions
 - b. Discuss lifestyle factors with survivors and identify healthy lifestyle goals
 - c. Create a chronic disease management plan
 - d. Link survivors to community services and allied health
 - e. Discuss psychosocial issues
 - f. Assist patients to self-manage side effects and symptoms
 - g. Two-way communication with the acute/hospital team
 - h. Access additional education or resources regarding cancer survivorship
- 3. Describe what hospital based health professionals can do to help general practice staff during cancer survivorship.

Examples:

- a. Provide a survivorship care plan
- b. Provide an explicit shared care plan outlining roles and responsibilities and expectations
- c. Communicate the valuable role of general practice to survivors
- d. Provide clear information regarding likely side effects and late effects
- e. Provide links to the Optimal Care Pathways
- f. Provide one key contact name and number for questions

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- 4. What is one action will you take after watching the video? *Examples:*
 - a. develop a survivorship care plan (hospital staff) or chronic disease management plan (general practice staff)
 - b. review the optimal care pathways
 - c. provide my patients with links to the consumer GP video
 - d. provide my patients with links to the Optimal Care pathways resource
